

LESSON: HOT DOG AND COOL CAT

GRADE LEVEL: PRIMARY

OBJECTIVE: SYMMETRY

MATERIALS VISUALS/MEDIA

CONSTRUCTION PAPER CRAYONS

REGULAR CRAYONS

HOT DOG/COOL CAT COLORING PAGE

LESSON STEPS/PROCESS

1. Follow the plans for Lesson 2, introducing kids to the warm and cool colors and show the video.
2. Following the discussion have students color the dogs and cats appropriately on the coloring sheet. Students may want to sort the crayons into piles at their table to help deciphering warm and cool colors. Make sure to help them sort lime greens and pinks into the correct categories and to leave the neutral colors alone.
3. Students can take the sheet home, or you can keep them for them to refer to for the next class.

LESSON 1: THE COLOR WHEEL

Pre-assess students using the hot dog and cool cat pres-assessment.

Introduce students to the color wheel and show them how they can understand color mixing by using the color wheel. Have them fill in the colors of the color wheel by using only the primary colors to mix the secondary colors.

LESSON 2: WARM AND COOL COLORS

Introduce students to the concept of warm and cool colors. Ask students to name things that feel warm and cool or remind them of feeling warm or cool. Point out that many of the things they mention also have warm and cool colors. Show them how the color wheel can be divided into 2 sides; the warm colors and the cool colors. ~~Have them fill out the warm and cool color wheel and add some of their favorite warm and cool colors that are not on the color wheel (Like pink, turquoise, gold, and lime green).~~

Let them get started coloring the dogs with warm colors and the cats with cool colors on the "Hot Dogs and Cool Cats" coloring page. (This can be something they come back and work on any time they finish early during the next couple of lessons.)

LESSON 3: HOT DOGS

Show students (and demonstrate) the step-by-step page on how to draw Hot Dog. Have them try drawing Hot Dog. (In their sketchbooks, if they have them.)

Next show them the 2-page "Drawing a Hot Dog" and "Dog Expressions". Let them try out a couple of their own dogs. Have them color their favorite dog with warm colors.

HOT DOGS & COOL CATS

Color the "Hot Dogs" with warm colors and the "Cool Cats" with cool colors.
