

LESSON: HOT DOG AND COOL CAT

GRADE LEVEL: PRIMARY

OBJECTIVE: SYMMETRY

MATERIALS VISUALS/MEDIA

9X12 MANILLA

CONSTRUCTION PAPER CRAYONS

REGULAR CRAYONS

HOT DOG/COOL CAT DRAWING INSTRUCTIONS (IF YOU WANT TO INCLUDE THE FACIAL EXPRESSIONS AND BODY PARTS YOU CAN)

LESSON STEPS/PROCESS

1. Follow the plans for Lesson 3, demonstrating how to draw a dog and cat.
2. On one side of the paper have students follow along step by step drawing a dog, on the other side of the paper have them follow along step by step drawing a cat. Emphasize drawing LIGHTLY! They can add accessories (collars, hair bows, name tags, bones, etc.) and change things along the way.
3. Have students choose their favorite drawing and color with appropriate colors (cool for cat/warm for dog)
4. If students finish with one animal have them flip over their paper and color the other.
5. Students take drawings home with them

HOT DOG AND COOL CAT LESSONS:

This packet contains everything you need to teach the Hot Dog and Cool Cat lesson:

LESSON 1: THE COLOR WHEEL

Pre-assess students using the hot dog and cool cat pres-assessment.

Introduce students to the color wheel and show them how they can understand color mixing by using the color wheel. Have them fill in the colors of the color wheel by using only the primary colors to mix the secondary colors.

LESSON 2: WARM AND COOL COLORS

Introduce students to the concept of warm and cool colors. Ask students to name things that feel warm and cool or remind them of feeling warm or cool. Point out that many of the things they mention also have warm and cool colors. Show them how the color wheel can be divided into 2 sides; the warm colors and the cool colors. Have them fill out the warm and cool color wheel and add some of their favorite warm and cool colors that are not on the color wheel (Like pink, turquoise, gold, and lime green).

Let them get started coloring the dogs with warm colors and the cats with cool colors on the "Hot Dogs and Cool Cats" coloring page. (This can be something they come back and work on any time they finish early during the next couple of lessons.)

LESSON 3: HOT DOGS

Show students (and demonstrate) the step-by-step page on how to draw Hot Dog. Have them try drawing Hot Dog. (In their sketchbooks, if they have them.)

Next show them the 2-page "Drawing a Hot Dog" and "Dog Expressions". Let them try out a couple of their own dogs. Have them color their favorite dog with warm colors.

HOT DOG AND COOL CAT LESSONS:

LESSON 4: COOL CATS

Show students (and demonstrate) the step-by-step page on how to draw Cool Cat. Have them try drawing Cool Cat. (In their sketchbooks, if they have them.)

Next show them the 2-page "Drawing a Cool Cat" and "Cat Expressions". Let them try out a couple of their own cats. Have them color their favorite cat with cool colors.

LESSON 5: HOT DOG AND COOL CAT FRIENDS

Give students a final piece of paper 9x12 or larger, and have them draw their favorite hot dog and cool cat. While they are drawing, ask them to think of a name for each one. (They could write the name on the back of their paper if they don't want to forget.)

Have students add warm and cool colors to their pictures. (Your choice of media.) A favorite media for me is using Crayola markers to make cat and dog "fur" lines. Then go over the marker lines gently with a wet brush. The marker "bleeds" and spreads the color between the marker lines. Darker colors usually work best for seeing this. Try mixing 2 or more colored fur lines, then see what happens when they mix.

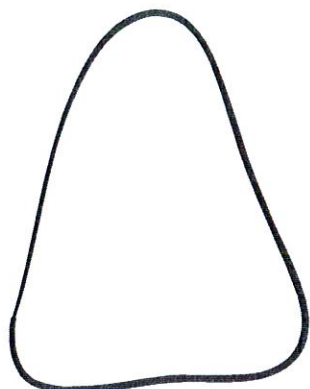
LESSON 6: MOUNT, LABEL, RUBRIC AND SHARING

Have students generate some ideas for the rubric criteria. What would each of the levels look like? Use the 3 pages provided to record some of their responses.

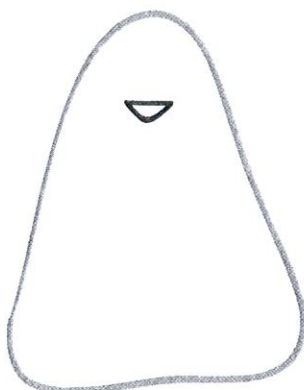
When students are finished with their pictures, they can complete the label and rubric.

Glue the finished picture and label to the front side of a colored piece of paper and the rubric to the back side, and they are ready to hang!

Cool Cat



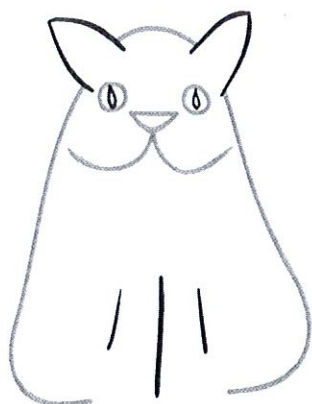
Start with a triangle with rounded corners. Don't make it too perfect.



Add a triangle for the nose.



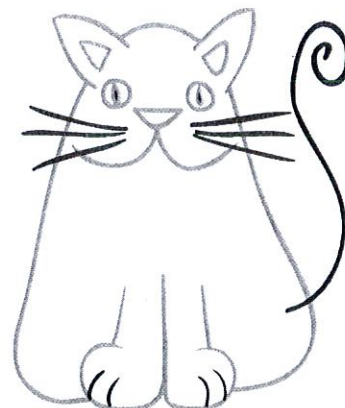
2 circles for the eyes.
2 curved lines for the cheeks.
Erase a place for the ears and feet.



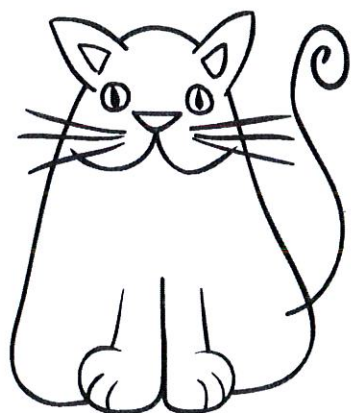
Draw 2 curved lines for the ears and the inside of the eyes.
Three lines for the legs.



Triangles for the ears
2 curved lines for the feet.

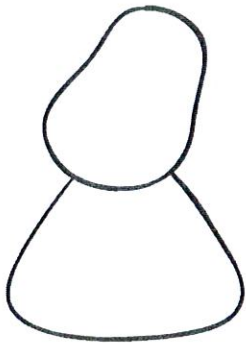


Straight lines for the whiskers.
Curved lines for the tail and toes.
Fill in the eyes.

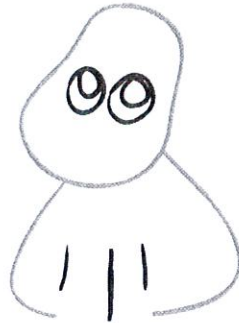

Can you make him your favorite cool color?

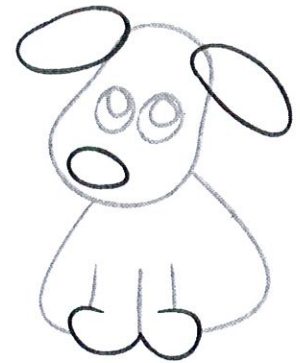
Hot Dog



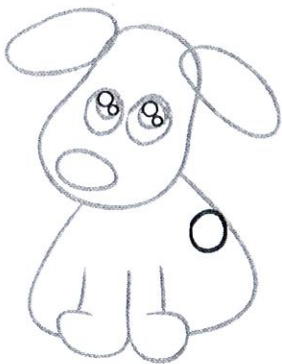
Start with an oval.
Add a triangle coming
out from below.
Don't make it too perfect.



Add 3 lines for the legs.
Add 2 circles for each eye.
Erase a place for the feet.



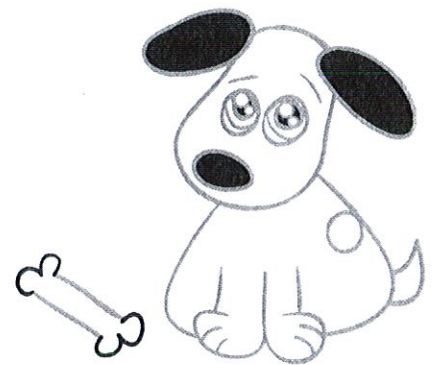
Add ovals shapes for the
ears and nose.
Add curved lines for the feet.



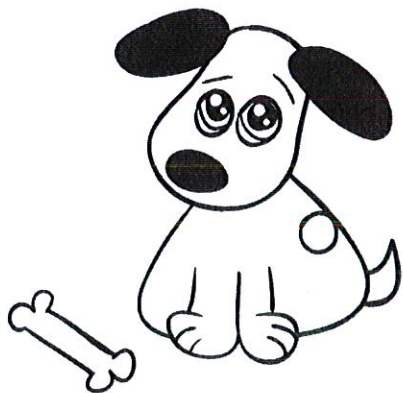
2 circles inside each eye.
They will be the reflection.
Add a spot for Hot Dog's back.



Add a tail, eyebrows, iris and toes
using curved lines.
Then add 2 straight lines
for the bone.



Add the number 3
to each end of the bone.
Color in the spot, nose, eyes
and ears.
